20	INVOCATION/PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE
21	Mr. Dorrill offered an invocation, and the Pledge of Allegiance was recited in unison.
22	OATH OF OFFICE
23	Mr. Dorrill swore in Mr. Andrew Fox as a supervisor.
24	PUBLIC COMMENT
25	No public comment was received at this time.

## 1 ROLL CALL/APPROVAL OF AGENDA

- 2 All five supervisors were present at the meeting, establishing a quorum. The meeting
- 3 was convened at 1:30 p.m. The meeting was properly noticed. The notice and affidavit
- 4 are on file with the District Office at 5672 Strand Court, Naples, FL 34110.
- 5 Dr. Bularzik added the Election of Officers and panhandling to the agenda. She also
- 6 noted that she will not attend the April meeting. Mr. Drum added discussion about
- 7 fishing to the agenda. Mr. Lee added FEMA resiliency to the agenda.

### 8 PRESENTATION OF 2023 LELY AUDIT

- 9 Mr. Nathan Phillips presented the draft audit as of September 30, 2023. It is 38 pages
- long, so he briefly highlighted it with the Board. The audit resulted in a clean unmodified
- opinion. Everything was in compliance with the particular statues that are applicable to
- the District. Total assets were \$14.9 million in cash. He noted that the District was in a
- 13 better cash position than the year prior because revenue over expenses was in a
- 14 surplus. By September 30 the total invested assets were \$9.8 million. Unrestricted
- money, which means money that can be carried over to the future was about \$4.8
- million. The District has no debt. Total general fund with cash was about \$5 million.
- 17 Total liabilities was about \$126,000, most of it in accounts payable and payroll. Total
- revenue was \$4.3 million, total expenses were \$3.7 million. \$4.3 million was budgeted
- 19 for expenses but only \$3.7 was spent from timing and community services.
- 20 Struggles in the District are escalating costs of payroll, supplies, and resetting of the
- 21 market for hourly rates. Overall, the District is in the right financial situation with
- everything moving in the right direction. Mr. Phillips indicated that the District's funds
- were required to be invested into Florida Public Qualified Depositor accounts. Mr. Drum
- 24 asked Mr. Phillips to explain what it means that \$4.8 million is fully secured. Mr. Phillips
- 25 explained that the Florida statutes have outlines of where money can be invested in.
- 26 Public deposits must be in a qualified depository which means there is liquidity at the
- 27 bank level to cover those deposits. The district is fully covered to get that \$4 million
- 28 back if something was to happen. FDIC is for the corporate world which is different than
- 29 government world which deals with public money. Protocol is that each one of those
- 30 banks have to maintain for Florida Statute purposes so the principal is preserved and
- 31 protected.
- 32 The audit was adopted as presented on a MOTION by Dr. Bularzik and a second
- 33 by Mr. Drum, with all in favor.

### 1 APPROVAL OF MINUTES FEBRUARY 2024

- 2 The following changes were made to the workshop minutes:
- 3 Christopher Dorrill was not present.
- 4 On a MOTION by Mr. Drum and a second by Mr. Campkin, with all in favor, the
- 5 workshop minutes were approved as amended.
- 6 The following changes were made to the regular minutes:
- 7 Christopher Dorrill was not present.
- 8 Page 2 line 4 capitalize Tiger Island
- 9 Page 7 Dr. Bularzik asked for a follow up later in the meeting about how it is possible for
- 10 the Lely Master to own the private road but not need to maintain it.
- 11 On a MOTION by Dr. Bularzik with a second by Mr. Fox the minutes were
- 12 approved as amended, with all in favor.
- 13 MANAGER'S REPORT
- 14 A. March Community Patrol
- 15 There were two unrelated brush fires. Two streetlight poles were lost from car
- accidents. There were an unbelievable number of traffic stops over the course of the
- month. Mr. Dorrill asked for clarification about the standby spraying assist. Mr. Bowers
- 18 explained that if a District employee is spraying by a light, a community patrol employee
- will watch them and make sure they are ok. He also shared that brush fires were not in
- 20 conservation areas and did not seem suspicious. There were 104 total stops by the
- 21 sheriff's department. There were 78 warnings, the majority of those written, 23 citations
- with fines, and 5 arrests majority of which were drug related in and around the high
- 23 school. Mr. Lee clarified that three were drug related, one was a DUI, and one was
- 24 \*inaudible\*.
- 25 B. Landscape Canopy Tree Update
- 26 Working with Ms. Elin Goetz and Hannula on this. Found out that County Right of Way
- 27 Permitting is needed. They have submitted for the permit and are in the process of
- paying for it. Once that is in place, they will be able to move forward with the installation.
- 29 Mr. Dorrill shared that the check for the permit was signed today.

# ATTORNEY'S REPORT

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- 2 Mr. Pires discussed the issue involving the access easement and maintenance of it.
- 3 According to Mr. Lee, in the grant of easement document it says that they are not
- 4 responsible for maintaining the road. Mr. Pires said he needs to look at if it says that the
- 5 LCDD is responsible or if it just specifies that the Master is not responsible. He said that
- 6 from a legal perspective the master would still have liability responsibility even if they do
- 7 not have to maintain it. If someone on a motorcycle hit a pothole on the road and got
- 8 injured, that person could make a claim against both the Master and the District
- 9 because the District has the easement and the Master has the fee ownership. He said
- 10 that in a sense they do have a responsibility under Florida Law to maintain it. Mr. Pires
- said that if the easement says that as to the District they do not have any obligation to
- maintain it, it does not mean that they do not have an obligation to maintain it as a
- matter of law. Mr. Lee said that there are three parties that use the road. Mr. Pires said
- 14 that any of the three easement holders could be held liable in addition to the Master in
- 15 the case of an incident. Mr. Drum asked if an easement holder could force the owner to
- bring it up to a certain standard on the grounds of safety. Mr. Pires said generally not.
- 17 He said from a legal perspective he thinks they have a liability by not maintaining the
- land that they own in a good and safe condition. Dr. Bularzik asked if Mr. Pires could
- outline this and send it to their attorney. He agreed to do so. Mr. Dorrill said he could
- 20 call Mr. Carter, the Master's property manager, and discuss this with him. Mr. Pires also
- 21 suggested contacting Collier County Code Enforcement, saying that the driveway is not
- 22 up to standards in the site development plan. Mr. Pires will draft a letter to their attorney
- 23 and Mr. Dorrill will contact the County Growth Management Department and see if they
- 24 historically have an approved site development plan that includes that street and
- 25 address the issue regarding drainage.
- 26 Mr. Pires shared that the alleged trip in fall, the Silberhorn case, was settled. He also
- 27 received an email from the counsel retained for the SFWMD issue. His suggestion was
- 28 that the District and the Master association get together soon to try to have a joint
- 29 memo to South Florida to work the issues out and ask for an extension. He will talk to
- 30 Mr. Lee and Mr. Dorrill after the meeting about this.

## **FINANCIALS**

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- 32 The financials were shared as of January 31, 2024. On the balance sheet there was
- 33 \$6.8 million in cash evenly allocated between operating and reserves. The vast majority
- of non-ad-valorem assessments have been received and collected. Fixed assets which
- include the Lely Freedom Horses, the maintenance building, and the other hard assets

- 1 total \$10 million. Total assets on hand were \$16,633,000. There was \$60,000 in
- 2 outstanding payables at the end of the month. The income statement showed \$80,000
- 3 in assessments received. There was almost \$28,000 in interest earnings. There was a
- 4 high monthly expenditure for parts, \$8,500 in one month for patrol vehicle costs. Total
- 5 year-to-date expenses for all cost centers were \$144,000 under budget.
- 6 The financials were accepted on a MOTION by Mr. Fox with a second by Dr.
- 7 Bularzik and all in favor.
- 8 SUPERVISORS' REQUESTS
- 9 A. Election of Officers
- 10 The officers were elected as follows: Mr. Campkin Chairman, Dr. Bularzik Vice Chair,
- 11 Mr. Lee Treasurer and POA Liaison, Mr. Drum Secretary, Mr. Dorrill Assistant-
- 12 Secretary, and Mr. Fox, Supervisor.
- 13 The proposed positions were accepted on a MOTION by Mr. Fox with a second by
- 14 Mr. Campkin and all in favor.
- 15 B. Access Rd
- 16 Addressed under the Attorney's report.
- 17 C. Pan Handling
- 18 Addressed during the workshop with the sheriff's department.
- 19 **D. Fishing**
- 20 Mr. Drum asked if residents are allowed to fish on their property. Dr. Bularzik said that
- 21 there is no fishing in lakes and ponds at all. Mr. Drum asked if the District is able to
- adopt a policy regarding that like they have. Mr. Dorrill said while they do not own the
- 23 property, they have a lake maintenance easement which allows them to create and
- 24 enforce that policy for liability purposes. You also cannot launch a boat from your
- property. Mr. Dorrill said that the policy in this respect deals with fishing. Mr. Pires
- suggested going through the formal rule-making process and adopting a rule that can
- 27 be enforced by court action or otherwise. Mr. Dorrill will share what current policy says
- 28 at the May meeting.

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### 1 E. FEMA Resiliency

- 2 Mr. Lee got a call from his counterpart over at Winding Cypress notifying him about
- 3 \$100,000,000 that FEMA is putting aside, and the east side of Lely is in the zone being
- 4 discussed for flood plane issues. He said it does not include ongoing maintenance work
- 5 but includes stormwater sewer improvements to prevent flooding. The man from
- 6 Winding Cypress wanted to know if the LCDD would be interested in joining them in
- 7 pursuing this FEMA opportunity. Mr. Dorrill wants to know more if it is mitigation or
- 8 hardening appropriation or if it's a grant and if so what kind of strings are attached if the
- 9 money is taken.

### 10 **MICELLANEOUS**

- 11 Mr. Lee asked Mr. Carter if the Freedom Flyer is being worked on. He said yes. Dr.
- 12 Bularzik will not be present at the April meeting. She asked Mr. Bowers if they ever
- found the two men walking around sunstone asking for money, he said no. He
- 14 contacted the Sheriffs and they said that they did not have enough information to
- respond to it. Mr. Campkin asked about the crash that damaged the lamppost. Mr.
- 16 Carter said that they are just waiting for the new streetlight to come in and they just got
- the police report which will be shared with the claim adjustor.

### 18 **PUBLIC COMMENT**

19 No public comment was received at this time.
