## 22 WORKSHOP - LAW ENFORCEMENT AND PUBLIC SAFETY

- 23 Lieutenant McManus said the community is doing really well. He shared that there are
- 24 45 hardworking deputies assigned to the third district. The district itself is 84 square
- 25 miles with about 92,000 residents. Crime numbers that are typically looked at for
- 26 prevention by either a law enforcement perspective or community outreach perspective
- 27 typically focus on what they call part one crimes which are burglaries: residential and
- vehicle, robberies, and grand theft autos. Every crime is tracked but those are the big
- 29 ones that they try to keep a handle on and do community outreach events regarding.

For the Lely area specifically there have been five part one crimes for the year, two grand theft autos and three thefts from motor vehicles. He shared that in this case, in each one of those incidents, the vehicles were unlocked. He said typically when they have grand theft autos the vehicles are often unlocked with the key fobs inside. Any part the community can take in preventing those crimes is essential. When the vehicle is locked and there is still a theft it is often because there was something in plain view like a purse on the seat.

8 Regarding traffic concerns, enforcement in 2022 totaled 959 traffic stops in the Lely 9 communities. This year, numbers increased to 1348 traffic stops. In 2022 there were 10 123 total crashes, this year there were 99 total. They are seeing that enforcement 11 decreases the number of crashes. Mr. Campkin asked about how the high school 12 affects the area. Lieutenant McManus said that Mr. Bowers gives him information 13 throughout the year. The majority of people stopped in the community are residents of 14 the community not passer-throughs. Mr. Fox asked if cameras could be added on the 15 exits of Master development and monitored by the Sheriff's Department. Lieutenant 16 McManus shared about the real time operations center that started around COVID. 17 They are in the process of initiating a public private partnership. They have started 18 contacting residential areas to have that very discussion about having access to 19 cameras in real time. License plate readers will also place tech in residential 20 communities for boards to benefit from use. Mr. Drum asked what the law regarding 21 parking on the street is. Lieutenant McManus said that they do not have enforcement 22 abilities on the private roadways.

Mr. Dorrill asked Lieutenant McManus to touch on the County's new panhandling
ordinance as it relates to Triangle Boulevard. He explained that it is a pedestrian safety

- 25 ordinance. It reads that individuals cannot stand on median that is less than 6 feet.
- 26 Authorized to be there if it is larger than 6 feet wide. Typical violation of this ordinance
- 27 occurs when light is red, and a passenger of a vehicle offers a donation, and the
- 28 panhandler comes off the median and into two parallel lanes of traffic. They are not
- authorized to do that, and the sheriffs enforce the ordinance when they do that. If they
- 30 are standing on a sidewalk that leads out of a community, they are authorized to do so if
- 31 it is a public sidewalk. East Naples is the homeless epicenter in Naples for various
- 32 reasons including the jail and all homeless services in the area. Since Lieutenant
- 33 McManus took command of the District, they have engaged in 4x the amount of
- 34 property trespass agreements with various privately owned properties where they can
- 35 enforce as the agent of the property owner. They typically do so during the overnight
- 36 hours. They have encountered numerous homeless encampments. The Sheriff's

- 1 Department does outreach with St. Matthews House each month which help place
- 2 people in shelters and counseling. They are seeking to help, they are not just trying to
- 3 put handcuffs on people.
